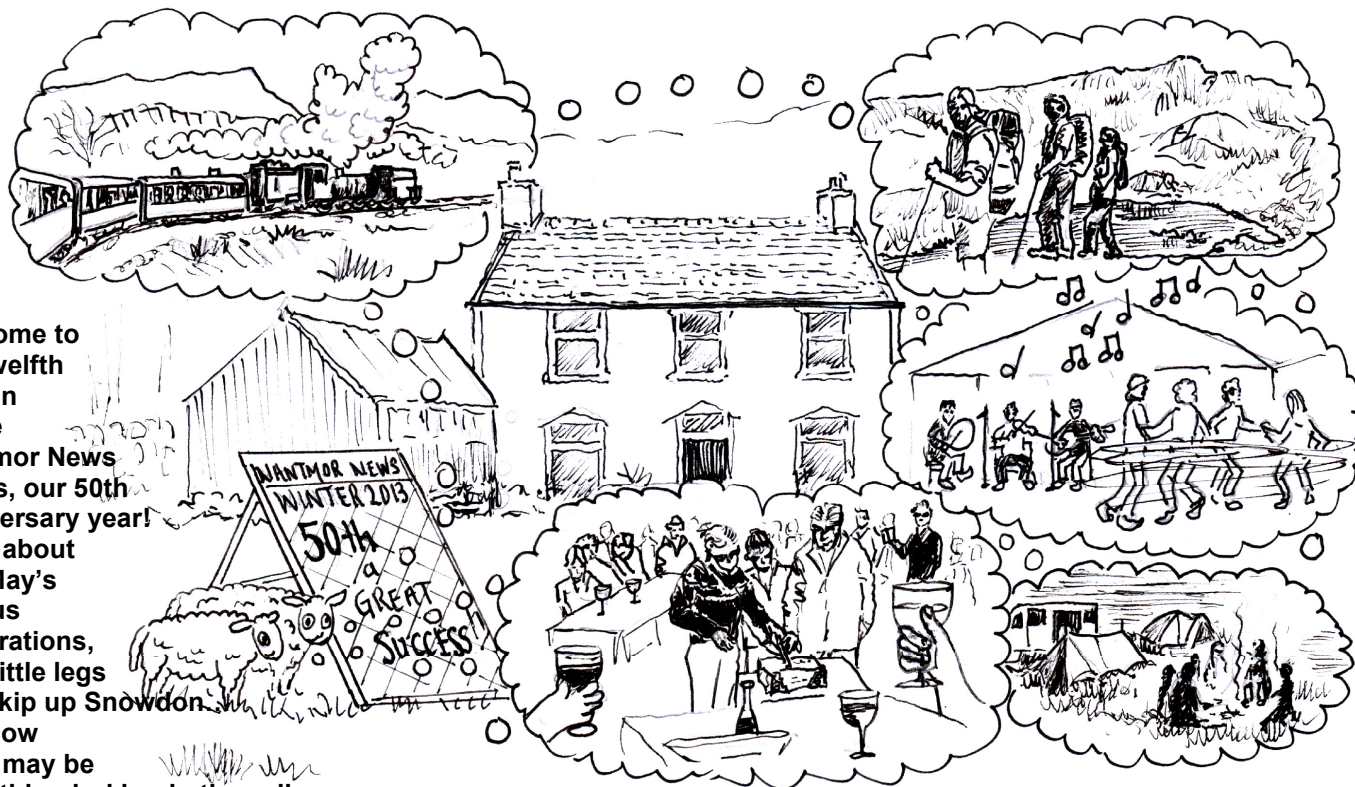

Welcome to the twelfth edition of the Nantmor News in this, our 50th anniversary year! Read about last May's riotous celebrations, how little legs can skip up Snowdon and how there may be something lurking in the valley...



This year, the fiftieth year of the Nantmor Mountain Centre, has been a truly significant one, and not just because of the wonderful anniversary celebrations in May. Since then momentum has been gathering for major improvements to the centre both inside and out, and bookings have again increased. As well as several new club members we welcome St Peter's School, Tewkesbury, and we welcome back Reaseheath College, also Sarda's search and rescue dogs for a weekend of training their owners. Different family groups happily filled the centre for almost the whole of August, the Lloyd Family Reunion gathering branches from far afield to renew connections with both Gelli Iago and each other.

But the highlight of the year for many has been last May's Anniversary celebrations, a culmination of nearly two years' planning and a landmark in the history of the centre. The challenge of squeezing in and feeding 97 people, of siting a marquee in front of the house and holding a barn dance with live music seemed far fetched at one time, but it all went like clockwork (with a bit of winding here and there) From Friday night's gathering in The Goat, an emotional reunion of friendships some of which were kindled during the early days of the centre, to Saturday's lunchtime spread of food; from the brief formalities of speeches and ceremonial cake cutting to the blurred images of dancers stripping the willow, miraculously avoiding 'the lump' on the dance floor; from Monday's nostalgic walk to Twin Lakes by a group of veteran Mountain Leaders to an impromptu barbeque on the field that night by a few hardly campers who simply didn't want to go home, the whole weekend was a huge success. We were delighted to welcome founder members Colin McCall and Les Foden who brought with them historic tales of the very beginning, but sadly missed those who were unable to be there on the day. Everyone took home memories of an exceptional weekend, and maybe thoughts similar to those of Phil Coley, who has spent many distant, happy days at Gelli Iago:

"I have been to a few but that must rank as the ultimate".

A Message from Tony Tatford, Chairman of the Association Committee

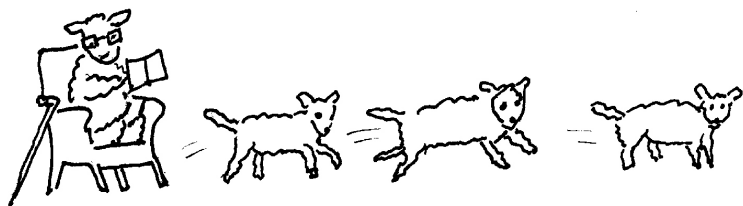

It was an especially rewarding event in that people came from far and wide with their own particular tales of recent visits or long-distant stays which gave rise to memories strikingly strong and obviously significant in a lifetime of experience. Equally poignant messages were received from many people who, for various reasons, would have wished to be present but were unable to attend. We raised a glass in your honour and wished you 'Good Health'. Thank you one and all.

Now, the committee has turned its attentions to addressing some of the concerns for the longer term security of Gelli Iago, as essential remedial work is being planned. Included in this, besides the obligatory care of the building fabric, is the consideration of how best to replace the classroom. Nearly fifty years old itself, this building is no longer fit for purpose and our Warden, Bob James, is investigating the prospects of replacement with something more modern but 'in keeping' with all our hopes and good intentions. Financial issues will have a significant impact with these plans and our search for grants and other such support will fill the time, and no doubt tax the patience, of many of our committee members.

If you think you could help in any way with ideas, contacts, or the time to help out with practical skills on a working weekend, please do make the offer. We are always keen to involve others and to build on the camaraderie and partnership that has united us all over the years.

This year's anniversary hasn't just been a good excuse for a bash, it's been excellent reason to look ahead and plan. NMC boasts over eighty members, with thirty two affiliated groups, yet we rely on just a handful to run the place. Truth is, though still sprightly and capable of some amazing feats, we're not getting any younger. That's why we'd love to have more fresh, young folk getting involved, *and* on the committee, so let us know if you'd like to help. And if you don't have time, then a bit of TLC whilst you're at Gelli lago can be just as useful, as if the place was your own, which in a sense it is - ours to share.



And in the same vein...

We've thankfully come a long way since the distant days of burning our rubbish, and tipping organic waste of every type into the stream, but things are still a bit different in this high Snowdonia valley. Thursday was wet...we had a gentle walk into Beddgelert for a much needed ice cream - an annual tradition for us that rain was never going to get in the way of! We were joined for the day by an ex-pupil who couldn't resist the urge to come back for the Gelli lago experience. She posted her return on Facebook and had lots of past pupils wishing us well and wishing they were there, including one who lives in America now! We drove to Llanberis for tea in Pete's Eats then headed for the Beacon Climbing Centre just to make absolutely sure the children were as exhausted as possible. Our last night was yet another late one, but there were eight very happy and contented children. And seven very exhausted adults!

Yet another brilliant trip to Wales. We had some new parents with us this time and they fell under the Gelli lago spell from the moment they clapped eyes on the farmhouse. The children are already talking and planning next year and I can't wait to be back there with them.
