"Wow!" ...others, impressed that the Centre exists..

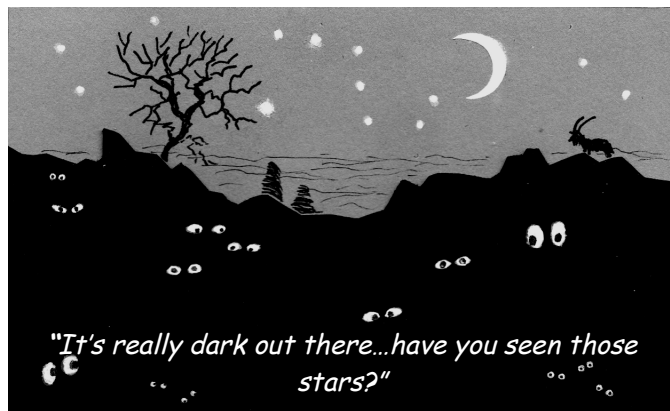
"So who owns it?"

“...the views from the top were incredible...” George

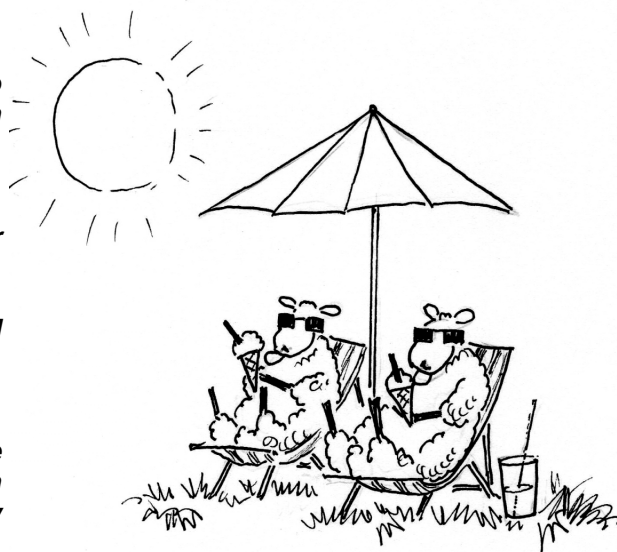
“...the first night was a bit scary as it was my first night away with the Scouts ...a long, hard way up Snowdon but it was all worth it for that view from the top!” Elliot

The other Matthew thought “...The sandwiches were boring ham and cheese ...but the upper floor had good showers...”

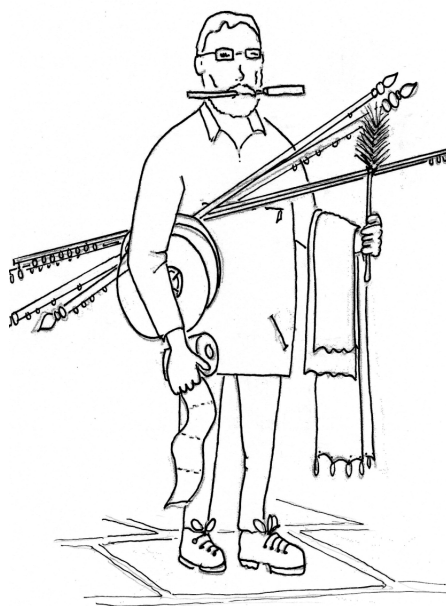
But Chris, it seems, was becoming a connoisseur of local cuisine..
