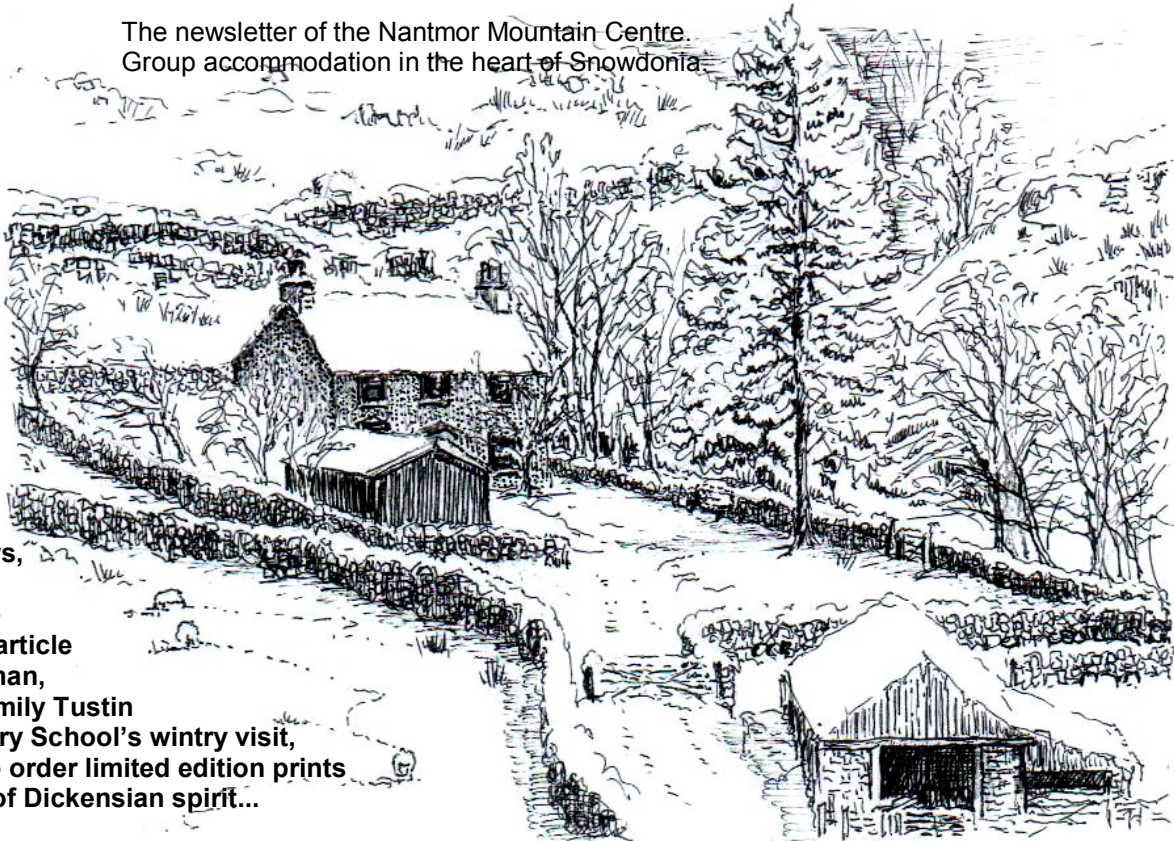

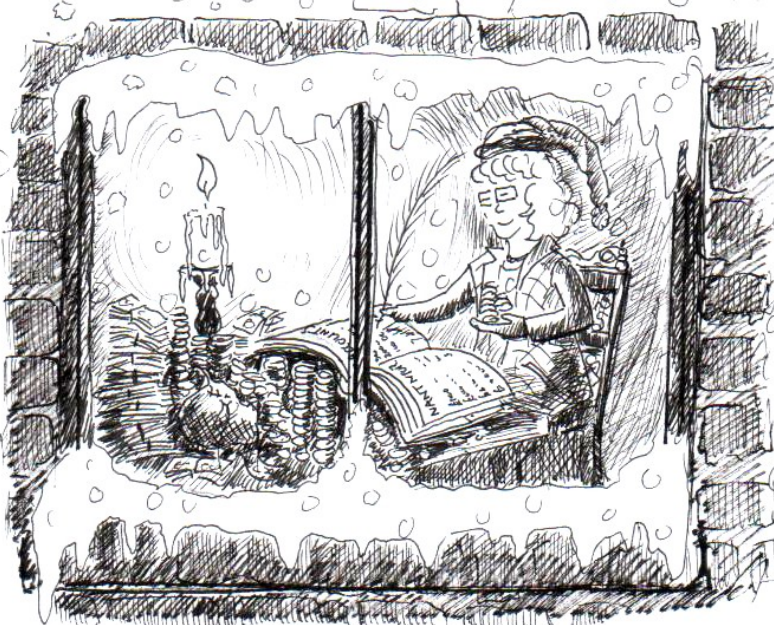


Halloween arrives early at Gelli Iago (30th Oct) and with fancy dress, apple bobbing and pumpkins cut out we celebrated the completion of our training."

"As you may have read elsewhere our running costs are increasing substantially. This means, I'm afraid, that we've had to put our charges up. Membership is now £12 for Mountaineering Club and Individual members and £20 for Affiliated members (reduced to £15 if paid before 31st January). After 31st Jan '09 electricity will be charged at 15p a unit (inevitable I'm afraid) and bednight fees will go up to £7 a night - **only £7!**

A MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIRMAN:

A NEW LEASE AND THE FUTURE

"Our level of commitment to the Nantmor Mountain Centre has been such that we were keen to begin the process of negotiating a new lease for Gelli lago some two years ago, in the hope of achieving a smooth and painless transfer in time for 1st April 2009. In the end, we have been in communication with the National Trust since September and are now seeking a common ground that will see the NMCA operating well into the future with financial and other commitments agreed at a level that support the shared charitable objectives of our two organisations.

The complexity of such negotiations can inevitably lead to periods of concern and frustration and we are grateful to the reception provided by members of the National Trust staff with whom we have had meetings and communication to date. At present there are some aspects of the anticipated agreement that will take much work to resolve. A small group of our Committee of Management has been authorised to carry out the negotiations on behalf of the Association. This group will report to and seek authorisation from the full committee for the final verification of the lease.

There may come a time when we shall turn to all our individual and affiliated organisation members for support in confirmation of the commitment we may have to make to secure our operational tenure at Gelli lago. We shall endeavour to keep you informed of the progress of our negotiations. Equally, we would encourage you to seek information from or to make any offer of help you may feel to be appropriate through your committee representatives or contacts."

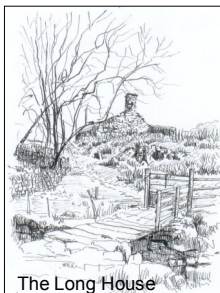

PRINTS ON SALE

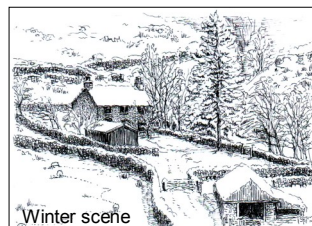

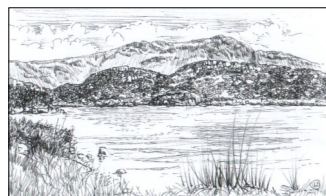

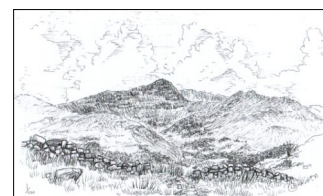
